Her focus is on increasing awareness of diversity and the importance of human rights and democracy. She studied Social Studies and International Migration and Ethic Relations. She was Project Manager at Intercult Productions (1997-2000), Program Manager of the Caucasus region at the Swedish Red Cross (2001-2002), Project Coordinate at Selam (2003-2005), and Head of the International Department at Riksteatern (2005-2013). She was appointed by several commissions as an expert in cultural development on a national and international level as well as a board member in cultural organizations in Sweden and in Europe.

MARIANNA SALZMANN was born in Volgograd, formerly Stalingrad, and raised in Moscow. She immigrated with her family to Germany in 1995. Salzmann studied Literature, Theater and Media at the University of Hildesheim and Creative Writing at the Berlin University of the Arts. PARTICIPANT BIOS

KHALID AMINE is Professor of Performance Studies at the Faculty of Letters and Humanities at Abdelmalek Essaadi University, Tetouan, Morocco. He was Senior Research Fellow at the International Research Center "Interweaving Performance Cultures" at Freie Universität Berlin, Germany from 2008 to 2010, where he now serves as Member of the Advisory Board. He is the winner of the 2007 Helsinki Prize of the International Federation for Theatre Research. Since 2006, he has been Founding President of the International Centre for Performance Studies (ICPS) in Tangier. Among his published books are Beyond Brecht (1996), Moroccan Theatre Between East and West (2000), Fields of Silence in Moroccan Theatre (2004), Dramatic Art and the Myth of Origins: Fields of Silence (2007). He is currently co-authoring a book project with Distinguished Professor Marvin Carlson entitled Theatre in North Africa: The Performative Turn in Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia.

OMAR ELERIAN is an Italian/Palestinian theatre director, deviser and performer. He trained at the Jacques Lecoq International Theatre School in Paris. As Associate Director at the Bush Theatre in London, he is involved in all the programming, producing and management activities. Elerian is also in charge of the Associate Artists. Alongside the Artistic Director, he establishes the short, medium and long-term artistic and entrepreneurial policies of the institution. His latest directing credits include the acclaimed site-specific production The Mill -City of Dreams (Bradford, Yorkshire), You're Not Like The Other Girls Chrissy (The Stage Best Solo Performance Award winner, Pleasance Attic, Edinburgh), Testa di Rame (Festival Inequilibrio, Italy), Les P'tites Grandes Choses (Maison des Arts du Cirque et du Clown, France) and L'Envers du Décor (Théâtre des Enfants Terribles, France). He was also Associate Director for Jericho House's production of The Tempest, performed during the Barbican's bite11 season in St Giles Cripplegate.

THOMAS ENGEL obtained a doctorate in Theatre Studies from the Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin in 1988. Between 1983 and 1992, he worked as a dramaturge in various German theatres. From 1988

to 1990, he was Assistant Director of the German centre of the International Theatre Institute (ITI) in German Democratic Republic, and between 1992 and 2003 Assistant Director of the German centre in German Federal Republic. Since 2003, he has been Executive Director of the German ITI and coordinator of the ITI European Forum. He has published in Europe and the U.S. and attended festivals and conferences worldwide. His most recent project is the Centre for Theatre in Conflict Zones, a co-operation project of ITI Sudan and ITI Germany.

ERIKA FISCHER-LICHTE is Professor of Theatre Studies, Director of the International Research Center "Interweaving Performance Cultures" and Spokesperson of the International Research Training Group "Interart Studies" at Freie Universität Berlin. She is a member of the Academia Europaea, the Göttingen Academy of Sciences, the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences, and the National Academy of Sciences Leopoldina in Halle. She has published widely in the fields of aesthetics, theory of literature, art and theatre, in particular on semiotics and performativity, theatre history and contemporary theatre. Among her numerous publications are Dionysus Resurrected. It was led by Artistic Directors Maarten van Hinte and Marjorie Boston and Business Manager Lucien Kembel. In 2012, all national funding for theater production companies was cut. Unlike most Dutch production companies, MC opted for a future without structural funding. MC is now comprised of two entities: the MC theater, a commercial venue for urban arts, managed by Lucien Kembel and programmed by Marjorie Boston, and MC.nu, a production unit run by Maarten van Hinte and
