Dear first year students!

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I. Important Appointments in the First Weeks

Registration deadlines for your courses

You have to register for your courses with Campus Management, the computer system that manages your course registrations, grades, etc.

The deadlines for registration for the winter semester are roughly the following periods:

1. *Limited-seats courses*: Beginning to mid-October (registration ends the week before the semester starts)
2. *Non-restricted courses*: Beginning to end of October (registration is still possible after the start of the semester)

The deadlines for registration for the summer semester are roughly the following periods:

1. *Limited-seats courses*: Beginning to mid-April (registration ends the week before the semester starts)
2. *Non-restricted courses*: Beginning of April to beginning of May (registration is still possible after the start of the semester)

Enrolment for language courses

Your language courses are organised by the Language Centre (<https://www.sprachenzentrum.fu-berlin.de/en/index.html>). Only after successful registration at the Language Centre (<https://www.sprachenzentrum.fu-berlin.de/en/anmeldungen/index.html>) will you also be registered for the courses in Campus Management.

Caution! The registration period for language courses takes place earlier than the general courses, approx. in the last two weeks

Email account

To be able to log into Campus Management, you will need an FU-Email account. If you have not received one automatically (the documents are usually sent out about a week after the enrolment documents), you should contact the Student Records and Registration Office (<https://www.fu-berlin.de/en/studium/studieren/immatrikulation/index.html>), they will be able to help you. Make sure you do this in good time so that you don't miss any enrolment deadlines!

IMPORTANT for those moving up: If you do not have a certificate of enrolment at the beginning of the semester or by the end of the registration period for courses and therefore do not have a ZEDAT account, a matriculation number or access to Campus Management: Don't panic! First try to find out from the Student Records and Registration Office whether you already have an account, even if you have not yet received their mail. They can also help you at ZEDAT if your account already exists. If there is nothing there yet: just go to the courses, you want to attend and explain your problem to the lecturers (you will neither be the first nor the only one). You will very likely be able to take part in the courses as normal and can register for the courses once you have your account. If you still do not have access to Campus Management by the end of October, please contact your lecturers, the Student

Advisory Service or, in the last resort, the faculty's Office of Academic Affairs (Studienbüro; studienbuero@geisteswissenschaften.fu-berlin.de).

II. Abbreviations

Time Management

c.t.: cum tempore. The so-called academic quarter. Courses start 15 minutes after the specified time, so if the course catalogue states that a course runs from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., then it practically runs from 10:15 a.m. to 11:45 a.m.

s.t.: sin tempore. If you find a time indicated as "s.t.", this means that the course starts punctually at the time indicated.

General Information

KVV or *VVZ*: (annotated) course catalogue. Here you will find the entire range of courses for the respective semester. <https://www.fu-berlin.de/vv/en/fach>

LP (CP): credit points, also ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System). The number of credit points for a course reflects the average workload, one credit point corresponds to approximately 30 hours of work.

StO and *PO*: study regulations and examination regulations. They set out the course of study and the examinations to be taken and provide the binding basis for your degree programme. https://www.geisteswissenschaften.fu-berlin.de/en/we06/lehre_und_studium/index.html

SWS: Semester hours per week. Number of hours per week over a semester. Most courses have 2 SWS, i.e. they take place for two hours every week for the entire teaching period of the semester.

Courses

V: Lecture, usually offering an overview of a larger field, topic, etc. Traditionally this means: sit in, listen. You will of course have the chance to ask questions. A lecture is usually held for large groups.
GK: Basic course. Imparting basic knowledge, insight into fundamental issues, etc.

Ü: Exercise. Basically a seminar that is focused on practicing particular skills, i.e. (relatively) small groups, in which participation is required ("active participation").

SpÜ: A practical language exercise focused on teaching of action-related communicative skills.

S: Seminar. A course dealing with one or more specific areas from the subject area of the module; students may be asked to contribute with presentations, to engage in course discussions, etc.

Additional Areas

ABV: General vocational preparation. This means that all students who are not studying for a teaching degree must complete 30 credit points in other areas. There are various options: internships, language and computer courses, etc.

LBW: teacher-related vocational science. This means that all BA students with a teacher training option take 30 credit points in specialised didactics and educational science. These are also specified in terms of content and can be found in the StO/POs. University Boards and Committees

AS: Academic Senate. The most important body of the university. It decides on the university development, including instruction, studies, and research.

AStA: General Students' Committee. The "government" of the students, so to speak, which is elected by the StuPa (the Students' Parliament). The AStA finances and supports student activities and can help you with numerous counselling services.

FBR: Faculty Council. It takes general decisions for the faculty (here: Philosophy and the Humanities).

FSI: Student Council Initiative. Group of students who care about their institute and organise everything from parties to first-year events.

IR: Institute Council. This is the committee which takes decisions on the (English) Institute's budget, the course catalogue etc..

StuPa: Students' Parliament. Elected by the entire student body of the FU. The StuPa elects the officers of the FU's General Students' Committee (AStA) and the members of committees, it decides on the student body's budget and on general matters relating to the student body.

III. Advisement and General Information

The FU has a diverse and sometimes confusing range of counselling services. None of the advice centres will be able to answer all your questions, so be prepared that you may be sent from one centre to the next.

Sometimes five minutes of online research can save you a trip to the student counselling service.

1. Libraries, Research, Teaching Material

Philological Library

The circular library in the Area of the Rost- and Silberlaube, which brings together the books of (almost) all philologies under one roof. Opening hours Mon-Fri 9-22 h and Sat + Sun 10-18 h. As this is a reference library, books can only be borrowed over the weekend or can only be borrowed regularly if several copies are available.

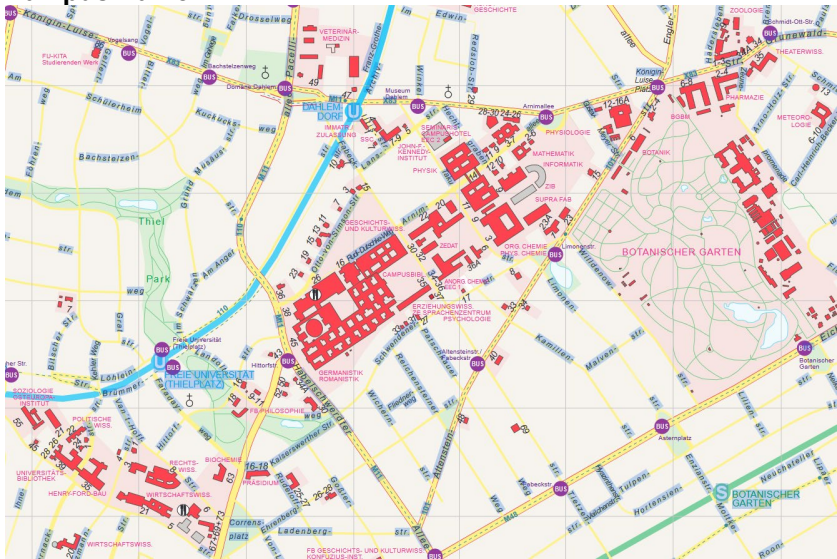
Caledonian Café
